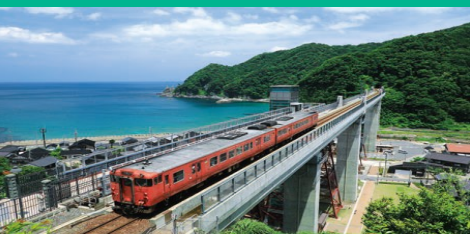
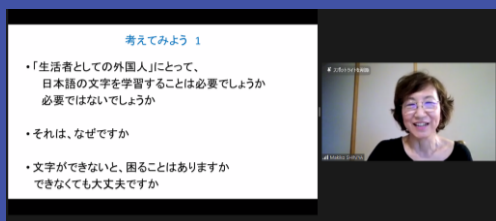

Online School Exchange Program

Since COVID-19 has made it impossible to accept foreign tourists, they have been actively promoting online exchange activities between Japanese and overseas schools. Last year, 12 high school exchanges were held between Taiwan and Hyogo prefecture, which were very well received. Some schools will continue to participate again this year and more schools would like to participate after hearing about the successful outcomes of last year. There are also requests from junior high schools to participate in this project. In the future, we are planning exchanges not only with Taiwan, which only has a slight time difference, but also with South Korea, Australia, and New Zealand. In addition, Hyogo Prefecture will continue to promote its own beauty and charm, while also participating along with the other prefectures in Kansai in the promotion of ‘Educational Trips to Japan’ to other East Asian countries and regions such as Taiwan, China, and Malaysia.

A look into Multiculturalism

The Introductory Seminar on International Cooperation “Cafe Caribbean: Learning about the charm of Central America from coffee” was held on Saturday, February 20, 2021. This seminar was co-sponsored by JICA Kansai and JICA Overseas Volunteer Support Group. In the first part, Guest Lecturer Mr. Nakahara Atsushi of Francisco Morazán National Pedagogical University (Honduras) explained the history, politics, and economy of Central America through a story about bananas and coffee. The second part was led by Ms. Imai Eri (Catracha Coffee Shop), Mr. Kadogawa Yusuke (Coyote Coffee Shop), and Ms. Oshima Ai (NatuRica coffee) who were former JICA volunteer members and currently import coffee from Central America. The three speakers passionately talked about their lives in each of the countries they were dispatched to (Honduras, El Salvador, and Costa Rica), the stories of the coffee farmers they encountered, and their thoughts on the environment. At this seminar, participants experienced brewing drip coffee together using the drip coffee that was sent to them in advance for applying early. Participants also exchanged their views on a proposal to process coffee cherries, which were originally going to be discarded, into jam. The seminar was an excellent opportunity for participants to become more familiar with Central America.



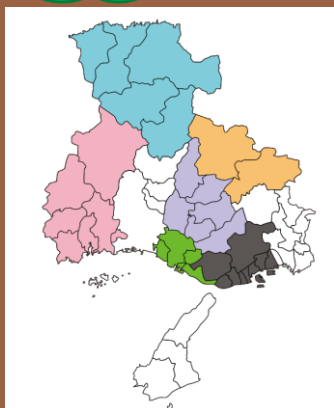

Building a Comprehensive System for Japanese Language Education in Each Region of Hyogo Prefecture

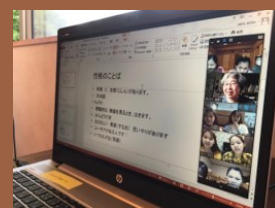
The Act on Promotion of Japanese Language Education, which came into effect in 2019, stipulates that local governments are responsible for implementing measures to locally promote Japanese language education under local conditions. HIA is promoting a comprehensive system with a five-year plan, utilizing national government subsidies, and aiming to help foreign residents learn Japanese and promote their participation in society.

Implementation of the Project

Hyogo prefecture is divided into nine blocks, and the project is implemented by one city or town in each block (in 2021, the project has been implemented in five blocks, including regions where the entrustment has ended). Japanese language courses by Japanese language teachers and events/training based on the participation of residents are conducted in cooperation with various related organizations. Regional meetings are held to share the results and issues with other cities and towns in the region.

The General Meeting of the Hyogo International Association Consortium was held online on May 21, 2021. The meeting began with the opening remarks by Akagi Maasaki (Chairman of the Board for Hyogo International Association since April 2021) who chaired the meeting. After discussing last year's results and this year's agenda, an award ceremony for the "Grassroots International Achievement Award" was held for individuals and groups that contributed to international exchange activities in Hyogo Prefecture. The award ceremony was not held last year due to the COVID-19 pandemic. As a result, at this meeting a joint award ceremony was held for 2020 and 2021 where 7 individuals and 5 international associations were commended for their achievements.

Ms. Fukuda has been working on the promotion of international exchange as the director of the Inami International Association for about 20 years until 2018. She has also been volunteering as a host family for foreigners visiting Japan for 30 years and is still active as a Japanese language volunteer. She is deeply involved in the lives of

Japanese language learners and supports them so that they can have a fun and fulfilling life in Japan. For example, she organizes cherry blossom viewing events, kimono dressing events, and accompanying them to the hospital when they are unwell.

Himeji International Exchange Festival Executive Committee

Recommended by the Himeji City Cultural International Exchange Foundation

The Himeji International Exchange Festival has been held since 1997. It is run by the Himeji International Exchange Festival Executive Committee, which is a local volunteer organization. The organization contributes to the promotion of international exchange, international understanding, and volunteer spirit. Through hosting the festival,

the organization provides opportunities for Himeji citizens to raise their international awareness and engage in volunteer activities.

The number of foreign residents such as Brazilians and Peruvians has increased in this area since around 2000. Kokusai Hiroba Ashiya was established in 2006 by the local citizens in response to requests from parents of foreign residents to teach their children Japanese. This organization has become well known through hosting international exchange programs in the local community. In addition to supporting foreign residents, they contribute by actively engaging in the local community, and deepening the local citizen's understanding of multiculturalism.

Mr. Kataoka has been teaching Japanese to foreigners as a Japanese language volunteer since 2012 and is widely trusted by foreigners. He creates a safe place where foreigners can feel at ease and facilitates interaction between the local community and Japanese learners so that they do not feel lonely in Japan.

There are many Vietnamese children living in Himeji City because the Himeji Resettlement Promotion Center accepted many refugees from Vietnam and other countries. Mr. Kanagawa felt that Vietnamese elementary and junior high school students needed supplementary tutoring class for studying and started this classroom in 1999. Teachers work closely with many young children with foreign roots, giving each of them individualized guidance. Furthermore, by bringing back

Nihongo Hiroba Okamoto was established in 1999 with the aim of building relationships where people can get to know each other, learn together, and respect each other. They make endeavors to achieve this goal by providing Japanese language learning support for South Americans of Japanese descent and returnees from China working in the food industry, international students, and expatriates and their families. The Japanese language volunteers provide detailed one-on-one support.
